

DAY TRIP AROUND SANTIAGO: Birding trip to coastal wetlands of central Chile 16th of July 2015

Trip Report, 16th of July 2015

I picked up Catherine and Alec Gillespie from the hotel Best Western Premier Marina in Santiago at 8:00 am. Because of the bad weather conditions in the Andes range we decided to visit the wetlands at the central coast of Chile.

Our first stop was at "El Peral" lagoon, a Natural Sanctuary in the town of San Sebastian. Here we had amazing sightings of many scrubland birds such as Tufted Tittyrants, Plain-mantled Tit-spinetails, Rufous-tailed Plantcutters, Austral Thrushes, Fire-eyed Diucons, the delicate and elegant Patagonian Tyrant among many others. A remarkable story was that Alec, who lives in Australia, enjoyed a lot the Green-backed Firecrowns feeding on Eucalyptus flowers. We spotted many typical wetland birds as

well; Yellow-winged Black birds, Black-crowned Night heron, Red-gartered Coots, Southern Lapwings, Yellow-billed Pintails, White-backed Stilts and more.

Once we finished here we drove south and went to "Cartagena" lagoon, another Sanctuary at the beach with the same name. As well as in the morning we had very good birding at this venue. We saw several species of ducks; Red-shovelers, Cinnamon Teals, Chiloe Wigeons, Yellow-billed Pintails and Lake Ducks. We were able to see White-winged Coots, Spot-flanked Gallinules, Silvery Grebes, White-tufted grebes, House Wrens, many Tufted Tit-tyrants again, Rufous-collared Sparrows, Neotropic Cormorants, Whimbrels, American Oystercatchers, Peruvian Boobies flying above the Pacific Ocean and finally the stunning Coscoroba Swan, we saw a couple and, although it is winter, they were building their nest. Surprisingly while watching the swans a beautiful White-tailed Kite perched in a cable just in front of us.

After we finished the circuit here we left Cartagena lagoon to continue our trip. Next and last place to visit was the Maipo river mouth, a beautiful estuary located in Santo Domingo resort, central Chile. Continuing south we drove to Santo Domingo then, from the car we saw very close a Variable Hawk, Black-chinned Siskins, more Plantcutters, Austral Blackbirds and many Long-tailed Meadowlarks. Once in Santo Domingo we made our first stop at the rocky beach searching for the Seaside Cinclodes, fortunately we were lucky! Here we also spot a Grey-flanked Cinclodes and a couple of Blackish Oystercatchers.

After this we walked across the beach to the estuary, while walking we saw Grey Gulls, Brown-hooded Gulls and more Whimbrels. When we reached the river we had incredible sights of the Many-coloured Rush Tyrants, White-backed Stilts, Austral Negritos, Collared Plovers, Two-banded Plovers, South American Snipes among many species of ducks and coots which we had seen in the morning. The only new species of duck here was the Speckled Teal (or Chilean Teal).

Before sunset we made our last walk along the river shore, good decision just around the corner we found a group of Black Skimmers. Among them for Catherine and Alec's delight one Elegant Tern, a few South American Terns and one Snowy Crown Tern.
